

When over a 100 people show up for a political meeting in the 21st century that is doing pretty good. In fact one could call it a huge success. Especially so in a small community like Matarangi. Some much larger towns in New Zealand with many times the population have held Meet the Candidate meetings this year and have had only half that many. All up across the two recent meet the candidate meetings at the Dunes held over consecutive weekends almost 200 people attended, with 120 going to meet the Mayors and the following week around 70 to meet the councillors.

The brainchild of Trudi Haydes, the Matarangi Meet the Candidates meetings no doubt will return for future elections, due to the success of the event and the format in how it was run.

"Some of my close friends were asking who are we going to vote for? I felt we needed the residents and ratepayers in the Northern Mercury Bay to have the opportunity to meet those standing and were going to represent our communities through to 2028."

Trudi approached Mark Bedford of the MRRA and Steve Hart of the KRRA. Both said yes to her about going ahead and offered their help and support. She also approached former TCDC Councillor Tony Fox to MC the event and Troy Leather from The Dunes who was happy to offer the venue. The response from the candidates was an instant and positive - Yes!

"I went ahead and booked the Dunes for two following Sundays. So when 120 people came from Matarangi, Kuaotunu, Opito and Whangapoua, as well as Coromandel and Whitianga to attend the first Mayoral candidates meeting the first weekend I knew right away that these meetings are necessary in enabling us in deciding who will be best to represent us. I was really pleased too that we received many questions prior to the meeting from the public that we were able to put to the candidates."

"I was close to this during the 2010 election. I remember well the changes needed in the TCDC at the time and how the newly formed council worked well together as a team," said Trudi. "We need leadership from the top and a strong team who can work together without falling apart."

Due to the numbers standing we were unable to accommodate our two regional council candidates who would usually have had the opportunity to speak. Current regional councillor Warren Mahar came up from Tairua, attending both meetings, and was able to talk informally with many of the audience and the standing candidates.

Warren's wife Liza has been an active attendee of all the meetings so far around the Hauraki-Coromandel region was really impressed with the organisation and venue of the meeting.

"We both agreed The Dunes Golf Club rooms were

the perfect venue for the amount of attendees. It was warm and cozy - not like a cold large public hall. It's a very nice Golf Club and we were very impressed with the organisation and flow of the meeting."

"In my opinion, the only way to make an informed decision is to attend one or two of these meet the candidates and mayors. I like the idea of surprise questions from the crowd as this definitely "puts them on the spot" and this is where you can see how they handle themselves and if they have the knowledge and or experience to answer the public's questions. Sort of gives you an understanding of their abilities and if they can work within a team."

"We also liked that we could mix and mingle after the meeting in the relaxed atmosphere of the Dunes Golf Club, where you could have a drink if you chose to and get to chat with the candidates and mayors whereas in a large public hall setting, a lot of public and candidates leave straight after the meeting has closed."



John Hackett was one of those who attended and at one meeting got roped into being the time-keeper and regarded the meetings as all in all a good promotion for the Council and Community Ward prospective candidates. "You can't fault their high hopes for the Coromandel," sais John.

"Local politics at best! Self-promotion; criticism of current candidates' performances; some waffly promises; some sincere and well-thought ideas; a real mixture of Coromandel culture, and in the main, good-intentioned people prepared to work for their community."

"So now we've heard it all, we have to cast our votes. Please, if you've gone to the trouble of registering, get out there and vote. You just hope that they don't have sincere community-minded intentions, fall on hard ground and fail because of that."

Another who attended was Alastair Brickell of Kuaotunu who saw it as a positive for democracy. "First of all, hats off to all those standing. It's a big commitment and not one I'm prepared to do, so many thanks to them all for putting their names forward. They all know that there's a reasonable chance that they may lose out so it could be a lot of their time for nothing in the end."

"Secondly, it was wonderful to see such a good turnout at both events. National media coverage would have us believe that people are not interested in local body politics but that's certainly not the case here on the Coromandel. Long may it last...if we don't partake in the election process we have no right to complain about who we get."

It is not the job of the MBP to tell you who to vote for but if you did not attend you can do three things to help you decide. Read the candidate statements, ask those who attended the two local meet the candidate meetings what they thought of the candidates and finally take a good look at the candidate adverts inside this publication. It is obvious though that a candidate who has taken the trouble to advertise in the MBP is by default a very sensible person and worth your consideration.

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
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FIREWOOD



The Matarangi subdivision was first mooted in 1973 by developer Ken Woodhead. Prior to this the Matarangi peninsula was farmed by George Simpson who is still living at Kuaotunu today. The only access into Matarangi then was by way of the Bluff Road and planning for the development was soon underway and the first sections on Kenwood Drive were released for sale in 1976. At the time of the stage 1 section release there wasn't yet even a formed road down what is now known as Kenwood Drive.

When the road was completed it had underground services but no water reticulation, so the first sections had to supply water for themselves, in our case at lot 47 we had a bore driven down, it had perfect water. Matarangi was seen by many to be a second Pauanui, mostly because it was a similar sand peninsula and Ken Woodhead tried to set it apart by having red scoria streets, which at the time was sort of unique.

Around this time the management of the subdivision also decided to plant a nurse crop of radiata pine while farming of the rest of the peninsula was still being phased out. This was no easy feat as there was much of the area covered in Kykuia, this nurse crop is why there were so many pine trees around until 2000.

Many will not know but in those early days, we all had to drive around a woolshed to enter into Kenwood or Matarangi Drive. Back in the late 1970's the section prices for a Kenwood Drive beach front section were \$29,950, one back was \$10,500 and across the road on Kenwood was much the same. By 1985 those beach front sections were heading for \$85,000.

As stage 1 and 2 of the development progressed along with the new Waimarie sections, Ken Woodhead started negotiating with the New Zealand Forest Service to get fill from hills adjacent to where Matarangi road meets SH 25.1 was part of these negotiations. The fill was to be used to form a road base for a new access road that was planned to go into the subdivision. It did go ahead and a temporary bridge over the Mapauriki Creek was built to facilitate what is now our only access. This bridge lasted a few years and along with a new tarseal road we later got a new concrete bridge.

From here on the Matarangi subdivision flourished, new stages were on the market, and prices were climbing at

one stage sometimes by \$1000 dollars a week. I think this was around 1985. For all that though there were still only a few permanent residents. At the time there were some good attempts to progress commercial businesses. My wife Heather ran a little shop selling only bread, milk and papers. Blue Lewis had a bulk tank installed and sold petrol. These were hugely successful and showed the way for the commercial centre we have here in Matarangi today.

The toll call boundary between Coromandel and Whitianga used to be about the Mapauriki stream so it was a toll call to ring from here in Matarangi to the Clague house where Pook used to live on the other side of the boundary. Another detail I recall is that Canadian geese were introduced to this area by a local in the mid 1970's, just 7 birds!

As Matarangi's size was increasing, water reticulation was now needed to be installed. However water supply became an issue and after some research it was decided to source water from the Opitonui stream across the harbour approximately 5 km away. This required land owner consent, additional consents to cross the harbour including a consent to blast a trench through the main channel. Not a quick or a small operation but with a lot of cooperation from many it was completed. New holding tanks were installed up on Bluff hill above Goldfields Place. Later a water treatment station was added near the commercial centre.

In those early days there was always a good safe airfield. It was well recognised and many people flew down for weekends. It was also quite an attraction for pilots from Auckland and afar to fly in to to visit. The RNZAF also held periodic exercises from here, and it was not unusual to see an Andover fly in and complete many practice take offs and landings.

Back in the 1980s a volunteer Fire Brigade was set up. I actually started this by donating a Wajax firefighting pump and 3 packs of hose to get them started. Not as grand as it might first seem, as I was working for New Zealand Forest Service and had access to all fire gear in the Auckland Conservancy. We had some years before done the same for Whitianga and Coromandel Brigades, and later I also did the same for the Kauotunu and Papa Aroha brigades. To get the Matarangi Volunteer Fire Brigade started I ran a series of simulated exercises and later took a number of volunteers up to big Class 1 burns in the forest.



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I also donated a firefighting shield for local competitions. Another thing I did was invite guest speakers in to pass on some of their experiences. One such speaker was a field medic for the SAS. He showed just 12 action photos and spoke to each. This guest night was so well received that we had to limit numbers but the talk was so graphic that some had left the room before the second slide was shown.

The developers of the time financed the building of a jetty. The same one we have today. It was built by local farmers Sonny Vause and Ian O'Brien, and interestingly it was built without any consent and when in the early 90s Regional Councils and DOC came into being, they insisted on having retrospective consents being applied for.

As numbers increased in the subdivision so did the boating activities. I set about placing the first harbour markers, and I asked and got some long treated poles from the council engineer. I blew them in with a water jet made up from a Wajax pump. The first one went in so easy it went too deep and had to be lifted back out.

Social activities increased as more and more permanent residents arrived into the community. The Volunteer Fire Brigade became a great meeting point, the fishing club was formed. During the summer a Sand Castle competition was organised and run by local Builder Phil Forsyth. Also the Cardboard Cup and the Big Treasure Hunt, both children's events that have been run by Richardson's Paul Fotate.

For a number of years Blue Lewis and a couple of friends hosted a very popular flounder night down at the jetty. They would set some nets, spread the word, and then BBQ them for anyone who wanted to come. Often it drew big crowds. I always have filleted my flounders and when everyone saw what I did and tried them, it was a bit of a game changer so I finished up filleting on flounder night and not doing much eating!

The Editor's Desk

VOTE 25

The local election season is now upon us with meet the candidate meetings around the peninsula underway, billboards are popping up on roadsides, and candidates out on the hustings seeking your vote.

A palpable sense of change is in the air as places like the Coromandel deal with a post covid world of blighted by cost of living pressures and societal upheaval. This will impact on how voters caste their vote this year. Rate rises are way ahead of inflation and now over \$5000 per annum in places like Matarangi and Kuaotunu. Residents and ratepayers are seemingly on the warpath.

They want to see the TCDC trim its spending back to the basics and concentrate on water infrastructure, local roads, public toilets, parks and reserves, lowering consenting costs and timeframes to build as well as keeping the Coromandel the best place to live in the country.

A major report from the Think Tank the New Zealand Initiative from last December noted that Local government in New Zealand now suffers from a democratic void due to changes in the Local Government Act since its inception 23 years. The report states that though citizens elect mayors and councillors, believing they are choosing leaders who will guide their communities' futures, these representatives lack genuine power to govern. Actual authority to get things done increasingly lies more with unelected officials, often out of public sight. It takes a very capable and strong group of people elected by the community as our Mayors and Councillors to make sure that what us the public votes for is enacted and clear governance oversight undertaken. Our responsibility as voters and rate payers as we will hand over \$15000 per household to Council via rates in the next 3 years is to make sure elect them for reasons more than just been lovely enthusiastic people who love the local area.

To that end beyond the candidate statements, the MBP thought that with such a large lineup of candidates to choose from of those standing to represent us in the Mercury Bay, that it would fire off to all the candidates with the following two questions to drill down to some specifics prior to the meeting at The Dunes. 1. What experience and insights can you bring to the position of Councillor / Community Board Member that can benefit our local community? 2. What are the main policies or outcomes that you hope to advance for the people of the Mercury Bay over the next council term?

Not all the candidates replied in a timely fashion as I believed that 72 hours prior was time enough, but those who did gave great responses.



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

He chaired the Infrastructure Committee and was Deputy Mayor from 2016. "In our first term we achieved a rate reduction of 4.5%, a major turnaround from the 21% forecasted increase."

"We drove efficiencies, reduced expenditure and borrowings. We delegated Community Boards greater decision-making power. I understand what's required to turn Council around. I bring experienced leadership and practical solutions," said Tony. Tony says that with his engineering background and life experience it enables him to "think outside the square" and get the basics right. "I will work to cap rates, drive efficiencies, reduce borrowing, prioritise core services, increase transparency, and restore local democracy by delegating greater power to Community Boards."

Local business owner and current Councillor John Grant brings strong leadership from a senior management career and Council roles on the Chief Executive Committee, Risk and Assurance Committee, Civil Defence Group, and Waters Working Group. "Running Coromandel Insurance Services and CFM. I champion financial discipline, represent ratepayers effectively, and drive positive outcomes for Mercury Bay."

John says that he'll keep Council costs in check by cutting unnecessary spending and prioritising core services like roads and water. "I'll push for sensible water reforms under Local Water Done Well including speedy resolution of the current non-metered charging issue, advocate pausing non-essential projects, and ensure rate rises are restrained. I'll work to lessen ratepayers' burdens and deliver value for the ratepayer dollar."

Also standing for council again is Deli Connell who currently sits on the Hauraki Gulf Forum, the Community Resilience committee which has oversight over storm recovery and disaster response and sits on the Matarangi Stormwater stakeholder group. "I have built strong relationships with the Northern Resident and Ratepayer Associations over the twelve years I have been an elected member for our Ward."

Deli has advocated for the Kuaotunu Peninsula Dark Sky initiative and Bluff Track Connectivity Project as examples and against Capital Value rating and, if the new Council has the numbers, would like that decision revisited. "We had a great model when Glenn Leach was Mayor. Community Boards are currently frustrated and disenfranchised. My goal is to be part of a new Council, with the right leadership, prepared to make changes here. Getting future rate increases down close to CPI."

First time candidate Flemming Rasmussen brings a legal and business background to the role of councillor. "I practice law and have proven, successful business and leadership experience. We need local decisions by locals, for locals. We need value for our rates. I bring a results-focused, no-nonsense approach to governance and leadership, anchored in financial, business and legal acumen. We face significant challenges. Difficult calls are required. TCDC must be put on a disciplined, fiscally sustainable path."

According to Flemming the status quo is not an option and real change is required. "We have endured three years of +36% unaffordable, unsustainable rate increases, planned debt tripling, quadrupling of interest costs, and a lack of transparency and accountability. Like rust, TCDC's ever-increasing bureaucracy does not sleep. We need to get Council Back-to-Basics. Delivering core services only with a relentless focus on cost-efficient service delivery."

Kim Abrahamson would like to see the repowering of local boards which will deliver local decision making. "Locally driven priorities will result in better outcomes for our ward. I will focus on achieving positive momentum to progress core infrastructure projects. Accountability is a key focus area and I look forward to understanding what systems exist and how they can be improved to provide greater transparency."

With this comes the experience of dealing with people and problems, the ability to sort the wheat from the chaff and the ability to recognise and appreciate common sense."

Peter would like to see the Board with a wider authority to action policies and changes in our District. "At the present time I think the Council leads the Community Board and I would like to see the Board with more autonomy."

Jo Pullen is an Opito Bay resident whose children attend Te Rerenga school. Jo has a background in design, a degree in architecture, and experience as a successful business owner and landlord. "I bring a practical and innovative mindset to the role. My experience living on a boat and interacting with isolated communities has taught me the importance of community, resilience, and adaptability."



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

Huge congratulations in particular to Noah Linnecar who came in 2nd in the 10 year boys, and to Molly Devoy, Pippa Bay and Jessica Lendrum, who came 3rd, 4th and 5th, in the 9 year girls. Students from Ruma Rangi had a busy morning planting for 'Trees for Survival' recently. Around 750 native trees were planted, mainly on Dyon Ross and Kayla Clarke's land, over the road from school, with the remainder planted out in the school paddock, adding to the native trees that have been planted there over the past few years. We enjoyed a visit from the Japanese students at Evakona Language School. Our Year 5&6 students welcomed them by singing waiata and doing a haka. The visitors replied with two songs, before having a walk around the school and talking to our students. They enjoyed the opportunity to visit a rural New Zealand School. Last week our entire school performed at the Ahurei Kapa haka Festival with all the other schools on the peninsula at Mercury Bay Area School. The idea for having our own kapa haka design began nearly two years ago with children putting forward their designs that represented the area we live in. Our feature article of the month Ten Years ago was written by Harriet Brickell who reported on the amazing work of the Kuaotunu Hall Committee who were at the time right in the midst of the hall restoration process including many of the historical artifacts that are now on display at the hall.

Harriet highlighted the preservation of a couple of significant treasures. The WW1 Kuaotunu School Roll of Honour and the Kuaotunu Football Club 1891 Banner. She noted that the restoration consultant made the comment when she saw the Football Club banner that this is possibly one of the first banners with a silver fern on a black fabric, several years before the All Blacks became the All Blacks and had the silver fern on their jerseys which was around 1905 or 1906. So the iconic silver fern may have originated right here in Kuaotunu!

Ten years ago we got holiday snaps from Pete and Marie Murphy and Graeme and Judy Hall,

who were living it large across the West Coast of the USA taking in all the of the great scenery. Judy wrote a few words about what they got up to including Graham attending his son's stag do at Hooters in Las Vegas and that Graeme and Pete joined the younger boys to do the famous Las Vegas roller coaster after a few beers. Judy says you could imagine the rest.

In the Fire Report we learnt of notable achievements by some of our volunteers in terms of national unit standards. Brendan O'Connell gained a national certificate in fire and rescue services vegetation level 2 and Paul Shaw gained a national certificate in fire and rescue services level 4. Paul's achievement is particularly significant because very few people in New Zealand have achieved this level 4 certificate.

We also reported on the first birthday of Puku and Kerre's wine club who had Tohu and Aronui Vinewards attending. There were lots of prizes given out and a number of members went home with wine, fishing rods, crystal glasses and even cognac. A hot ham on the bone went down a real treat but it was the birthday cake baked by Brenda from Pipers café that was the real hit. A rich, moist chocolate cake topped with berries. Yum.



This is the month of eclipses as very unusually we have both a lunar and solar eclipse to view. The first will be the lunar eclipse (sometimes referred to as a 'Blood Moon' in the media) at dusk on September 8 when the Earth's shadow covers the Moon. The much more rare partial solar eclipse will begin at sunrise on the 22nd with the eclipse underway when it rises. The Earth will not be totally in the Moon's shadow so it will not be a total eclipse but interesting to watch nevertheless as the Moon progressively appears to take a bite out of the Sun as it slowly moves between us and the Sun. Never stare directly at the Sun or use binoculars or a telescope to look at the Sun as instant blindness can result. However safe solar viewing glasses will be available to purchase from Stargazers (866-5343) but only from September 19 onwards for \$5.

Meanwhile bright Venus remains dominant in the early dawn sky with Jupiter now sitting well above it. Slightly yellowish Saturn is visible all night rising just after sunset. Faint Mars is low in the west after sunset.

There will be one Chinese Tiangong and many International Space Station (ISS) passes to enjoy this month but, as usual, timings may change especially towards the end of the month if they have to be moved to avoid space junk. Always best to check the website heavens-above.com for updated timings.

September 6 - The almost full Moon sits high above

September 7 - The Moon has moved down to lie just above Saturn and there will be an eclipse of the Moon very late tonight starting at 4:27am in the morning of September 8 in the west.

September 8 — Eclipse of the Moon starting just before dawn at 4:27am low in the west. It is at its best from 5:31am and continues as the Moon sets. When the Full Moon rises again in the evening it will be just above and to the left of Saturn.

September 13 – Mars sits just to the right of the bluish star Spica at dusk which makes a nice contrast to the red planet.

. September 14 — We have a long bright ISS pass from 5:50am in the NW.

September 16 - The Moon now lies to the left of bright Jupiter at dawn with a long bright ISS pass in the west from

September 17 - The crescent Moon now sits just below Jupiter and there will be a long bright ISS pass from 5:02am high in the west.

September 18 - Jupiter now lies above and to the left of the crescent Moon which itself sits just below the Beehive cluster and about halfway towards bright Venus at dawn. September 19 - The very thin crescent Moon now sits to the left of bright Venus at dawn with a bright ISS pass from

5:01am in the SW. September 22 — There is a rare partial eclipse of the Sun early this morning which will be already underway as the Sun rises with a big bite taken out of it. This will reach maximum at 7:10am then slowly shrink. The Moon's shadow moves off the Sun at about 8:15am. Use only solar glasses to look directly at the Sun and never use binoculars or a telescope otherwise instant blindness can result.

September 24 — The minute crescent Moon sits just to the left of reddish Mars in the west at dusk.

September 25 - The very thin crescent Moon now lies above Mars at dusk.

September 27 - The Moon now sits in Scorpio high above Mars at dusk.

September $28-Start\ of\ daylight\ saving\ time\ today\ with\ a$ Tiangong pass from 6:12am in the west.

Well all that time practicing on weekends and holidays alongside his parents Luke and Suzie when down at the family bach has paid off as Hugo is now the best in the world having won last weekend the GKA Hydrofoil Big Air World Cup in Sylt, Germany, against the top 16 competitors from around the world.

In the final against German kite boarder Finn Flugal with the wind hovering at just 13 knots, the conditions were challenging, but Hugo showed no sign of hesitation. Combining height, control, and smooth execution, Hugo looked untouchable and started to dominate the competition. In the closing moments, Hugo landed a trick worth 7.87 points to cement his victory.

It is the second time in a year that Hugo and his Kite Board have achieved lofty heights higher than any other in the sport. Just under a year ago he broke the world record for the highest jump ever completed by a kite boarder when he achieved a massive leap of 36.7 metres into the air at a competition in Porirua. For reference, that is the height of a 10 story building! We are proud that Hugo considers Matarangi as his favourite place for Kite Boarding.



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


